As a child in at a school in rural Sussex, I would regularly escape to explore the forests around the school.

Later as a youth I worked in conservation projects in the Mendips and Peak District, building paths, walls, steps, ponds, as well as coppicing, hedgelaying and rhododendron bashing, all the while

exploring our natural world and recognising its value.

Since then I have gained degrees in geology and business, and spent most of my professional life working in the life sciences industry.
